

New Features in Google Meet (as of 10/1/20)

New features are being rolled out in **Google Meet** over the next few months (**9/20-12/20**). Here are new features that are available now:

Host controls during a **Meet**

View up to 49 tiles in a **Meet** session

Jamboard Whiteboard App available in **Meet**

Host Control Features in Google Meet

One of these new features is **Host Control**, in which you as the **Meet Host** can turn various **Meet features on or off**.

To access **Host Controls**:

Join your **Meet session**

Once in your session, click the **People icon** in the upper right corner of your screen

Once you click the **People icon**, you will see the **Option for Host controls** > click to open.

Use Jamboard in a Meet Session

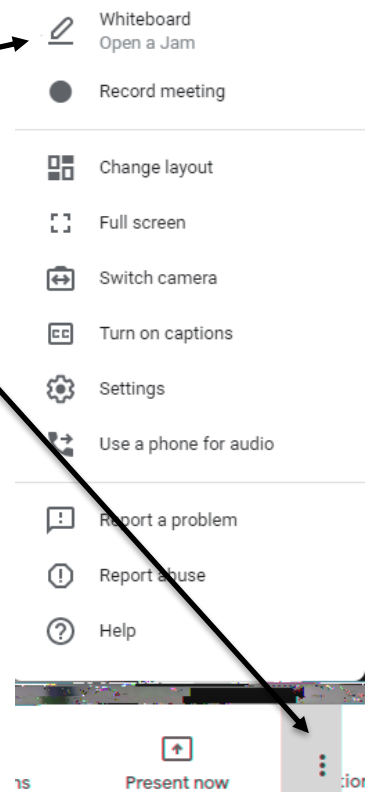
Another new feature in **Google Meet** is the ability to use the **Jamboard App** in your **Meet session**. **Jamboard** is a whiteboard app, so you can use this in the same way you would use or write on a **whiteboard** or **SMART Notebook file** in class. If you share your screen in the **Meet**, your students will see what you are writing on your **whiteboard**. There are other ways to use the **App**, which we will cover at a later time.

To access **this feature**:

Join your Meet session

Once in your session, click the **ellipsis** in the lower right corner of your screen

From the pull-up menu, click **Whiteboard – open a Jam**



Click as desired in **Whiteboard** dialog box. You will probably **Start a new whiteboard** unless you want to open one that you or your class previously made.

If that is true, click **Choose from Drive**.

Click **X** to close the **Whiteboard** box.



If you choose to create a new **whiteboard**, a **link** to it will be available in the **Chat** for your **Meet session**.
